- RAP Recycled Asphalt Pavement/Millings
- RCA Recycled Concrete Aggregate
- RAS Recycled Asphalt Shingles (pre and post consumer)
- Tires Embankment, HMA/WMA
- Fly Ash Concrete and Embankments
- Slag Ground Granulated Blast Furnace Slag in concrete
- Glass, Foundry Sand, Plastics
- New markets are continually developing

## **CONCERNS**

- Applicability performance/service life
- MSDS/toxicity
- RAP
  - Binder replacement in HMA/WMA
  - Use as GABC replacement/substitute
- RCA
  - Future chemical deterioration in concrete
- Quality Control/handling
- Bidding vs. virgin materials
- Regulatory local and national

## CONCERNS (cont)

- Costs
- Unfamiliarity
- Variability
- Availability
- Lack of standards/specifications
- Champion/technical support
