

## VI. SUMMARIES OF ANY VIEWS PROVIDED BY CONSULTING PARTIES AND THE PUBLIC

DelDOT's public outreach efforts included consultation with area residents, property owners and potential interested parties. SHPO involvement and consultation has been extensive in term of plan overview, written and verbal coordination/communications, resource identification needs, scope changes and field assessments.

No consulting parties were specifically identified or determined directly for the Little Heaven Grade Separated Intersection. However, all federally and state recognized Native American Tribes were contacted and declined to participate as consulting parties. However, the Tribes could become interested parties for this undertaking and during all continued archaeological efforts for the entire SR 1, Little Heaven Grade Separated Intersection Project due the presence of Native American archaeological sites within the APE. The attached Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) (see **Appendix A**) better identifies their involvement and role in continuing efforts.

Owners of the Mount Olive School (Department of Education) were contacted regarding impacts and the status of their state owned property. The question was also raised about the condition and status of the building with its lack of use/occupation and upkeep. At this time, the agency did not express specific historic preservation concerns and potential impacts upon their property or within National Register boundaries. Changes in access were not a concern either. The use of the building, now and into the future, has not been determined by this organization.

Trustee's for the Barratt's Chapel and Cemetery were contacted on several occasions. The relocation or removal of the fixtures (bell, sign, and trees) was coordinated, as well as improvements in existing roadway shoulder access into their property. Improvement to their entranceways is not a result of the other transportation measures, but as a request to improve safety and ease of accessing the property. This added measure was not unreasonable.

No other property owners or organizations were known to express a historic preservation concern or view upon his/her property. Public outreach will continue during the proposed Phase II and III archaeology in order to continue with the public involvement process as deemed appropriate for the level of effort.
