

## Delaware Sign Law

- Signs may not be placed within the State's Right of Way.
- Although not always exact, a good rule of thumb is that the Right of Way is typically one foot behind any utility poles.
- Utility poles are the large wooden poles that carry electric, phone, and cable wires that typically run parallel to the roadway.

### Signs are also **NEVER** allowed:

- On utility poles, light poles, traffic signal poles, or road signs.
- On bridges or any overpass.
- In medians, islands, or gore areas.

Signs placed illegally are not only unattractive, but can be dangerous to motorists and pedestrians.

Each sign that is in violation results in a fine of \$25, and a \$15 recovery fee.

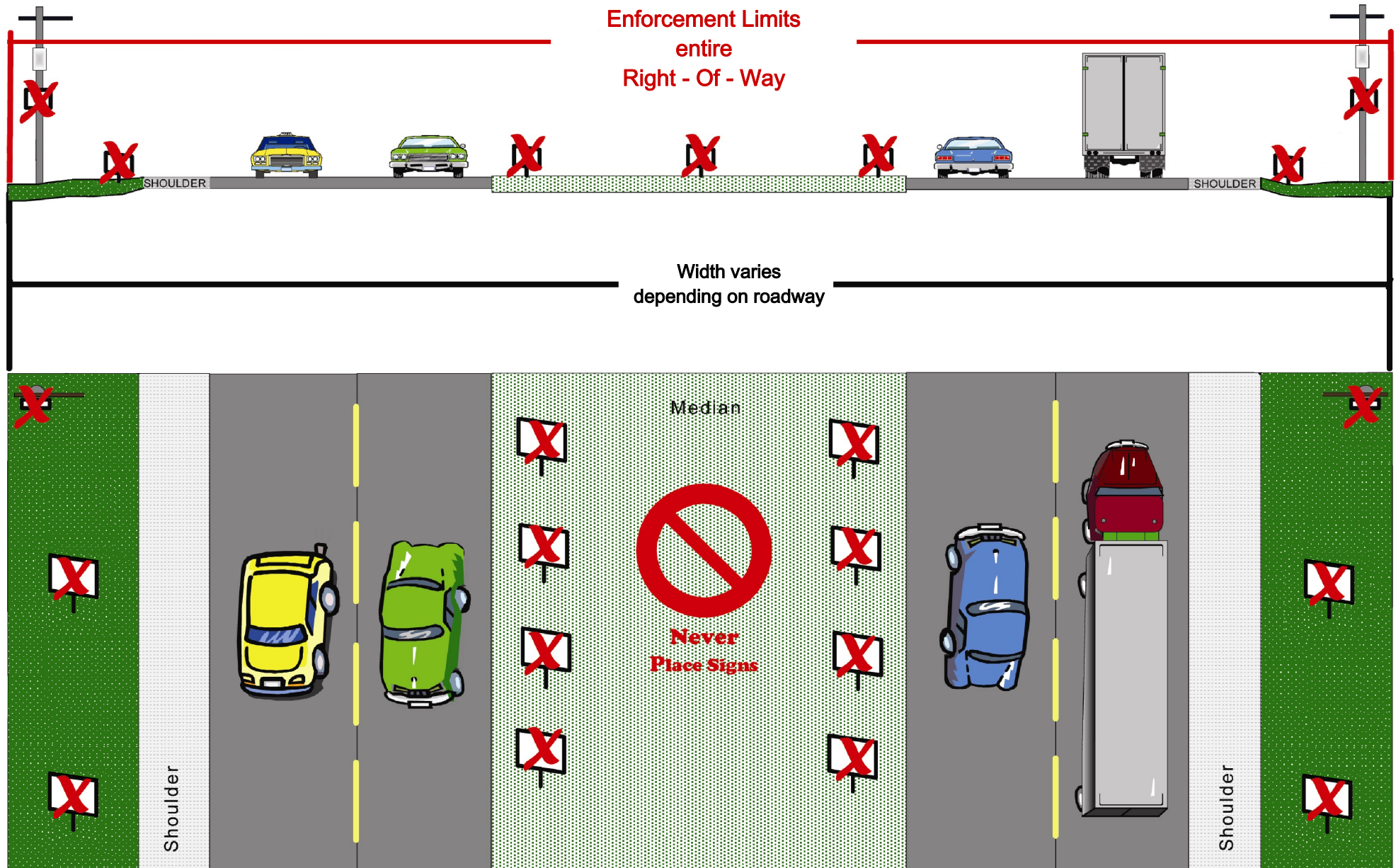

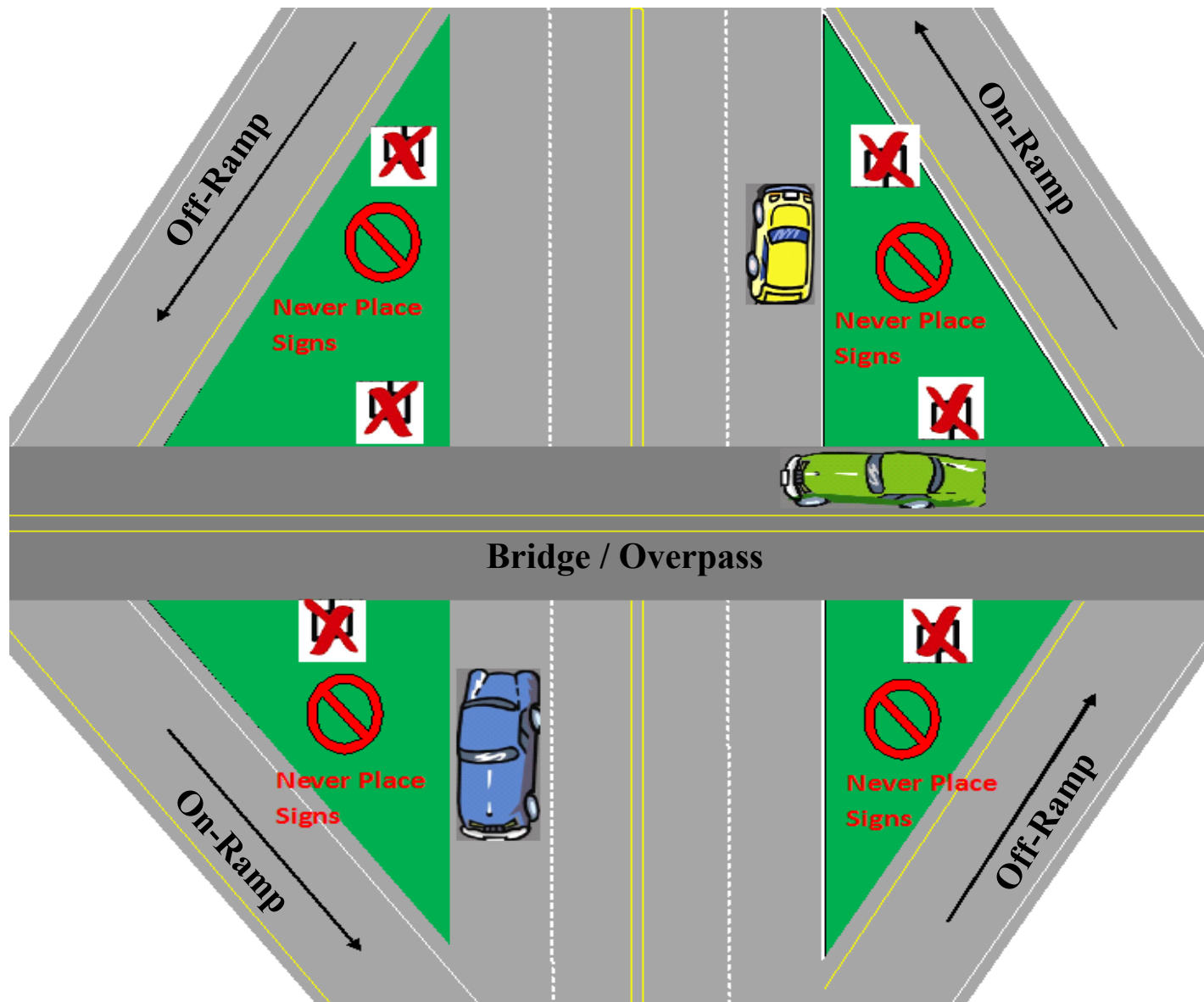
