Brandywine Raceway. US 202N, Wilmington. Pari-mutuel night harness racing March-September. 478-1220.

Brandywine River Museum. US 1, North of Kennett Square, PA. A restored century-old grist mill features paintings by three generations of the Wyeth family and other American artists. (215) 388-7601.

Brandywine Zoo. North Park Dr., Brandywine Park, Wilmington. Collection of North and South American animals, children's zoo, many other displays. 571-7747.

Cooch's Bridge. DE 4 east of DE 896, Newark. Scene of Battle of Cooch's Bridge, Sept. 3, 1777. Only Revolutionary War battle fought in Delaware. Tradition holds that the new 13-star flag, the Stars and Stripes, was unfurled in this battle. Free.

Delaware Art Museum. 2301 Kentmere Pkwy., Wilmington. Works of Winslow Homer, Thomas Eakins, Edward Hopper, Robert Indiana, Howard Pyle, N.C. Wyeth, Frank Schoonover, Andrew Wyeth, and John Sloan. Collection of late 19th-century English Pre-Raphaelites. Free 571-9590.

Delaware Museum of Natural History. DE 52, between Greenville and Centreville. Exhibits ranging from local fauna to the wildlife of Mt. Kenya, a walk across Australia's Great Barrier Reef, and an undersea world teaming with exotic marine creatures. 658-9111.

Delaware Park. DE 4, Stanton. Parimutuel thoroughbred racing April-September, 994-2521.

First Presbyterian Church, Park Dr. and West St., Wilmington. Original Presbyterian Church of Wilmington. Dated 1740.

Fort Christina. Foot of 7th St., Wilmington. Site of first permanent settlement in Delaware, where Swedes landed in 1638. Historic park and early log cabin. Free 652-5629.

Fort Delaware State Park. Pea Patch Island, a 10-minute boat ride aboard the "Miss Kathy" from the center of Delaware City. Civil War era prison fort. Includes museum, audio-visual presentation, and observation tower for bird watchers. A popular nesting spot for egrets, herons, and other marsh fowl. Picnicking permitted. Open April-

Grand Opera House. 818 Market St. Mall, Wilmington. Beautifully restored 1871 theatre originally built as part of a Masonic Temple, with an unusual castiron facade. Year-round program of concerts, dance, and film, featuring world-renowned artists. 658-7897.

Hagley Museum and Eleutherian Mills. Three miles north of Wilmington via Routes 52 and 141. On the 230-acre site of first Du Pont powder mills on the Brandywine River. Indoor and outdoor exhibits depict evolution of American industry and 19th-century millworkers' lifestyles. First du Pont family residence



Longwood Gardens. US 1, north of Kennett Square, PA. Year-round horticultural displays in 20 indoor conservatories and on 350 acres of



Nemours Mansion and Gardens. Rockland Rd. between DE 141 and US 202, Wilmington. Louis XVI-style chateau of Alfred I. du Pont. European antiques, aspects of the family's lifestyle, vintage autos, a 300-acre country estate with formal French gardens. Open May-November. Reservations required, 651-6912.

Old Asbury Methodist Church. Walnut and Third Sts., Wilmington. Dedicated in 1789 by Francis Asbury, first American bishop of the Methodist Church, Allan McLane, Revolutionary War hero, buried in adjacent cemetery. Weekdays only. Free 655-7060.

Old Brandywine Academy. 5 Vandever Ave., Wilmington. 18th-century schoolroom open as a museum. Visit by appointment only. 652-5715.

Old Swedes Church and Hendrickson House Museum. 606 Church St., Wilmington. One of the oldest churches in the U.S. standing as originally built and regularly used for religious services. Erected 1698. Swedish farmhouse, built 1690, now a museum. 652-5629.

Old Town Hall. 512 Market St. Mall, Wilmington. Historical Society of Delaware Museum featuring Delaware silver, furniture, and related Americana from all periods. Open March-December. 655-7161.

Old Welsh Tract Baptist Church. Welsh Tract Road, west of DE 896, Newark. Oldest primitive Baptist church in U.S., begun in 1703.

Robinson House. Naaman's Rd. and Philadelphia Pike, Claymont, Built approximately 1723. Inhabited by notables such as George Washington, Anthony Wayne, Lafayette, Robert Morris, and General "Lighthorse" Harry Lee during Revolutionary War. Open Sunday afternoons April-December and by appointment. 798-7335.

Rockwood Museum. 610 Shipley Rd. (1 mile off I-95, Exit 9), Wilmington. 19thcentury country estate with American, English, and continental decorative arts spanning the 1600s to the 1800s. Six acres of landscaped grounds. 571-7776.

USCG Cutter Mohawk 78. Foot of King St. on the Christina River, Wilmington. Built in Wilmington by Pusey & Jones. Co. and first launched in October 1934. Refurbished and dedicated as a living memorial to the men who fought with her in the North Atlantic, 656-0400.

Willington Square. 505 Market St. Mall, Wilmington. Composed of 18thcentury houses currently used as offices. Square named for Thomas Willing who in 1731 laid out the village that was to become Wilmington. 655-7161.

Wilmington & Western Railroad. Greenbank Station on DE 41, Wilmington. Ride through historic Red Clay Valley on an authentic turn-of-the-century steam train. Open Sundays, May-October. 988-1930.

Winterthur Museum and Gardens. DE 52, six miles northwest of Wilmington on Rt. 52. The world's premier collection of decorative arts made or used in America from 1640 to 1840. The collection, housed in the former country home of the late Henry Francis du Pont, is displayed in period room settings and surrounded by 200 acres landscaped in the 18th century English park tradition. Reservations required for some tours. 654-1548.

New Castle

Amstel House Museum. Fourth and Delaware Sts. A glimpse of life in the 18th century, including a complete Colonial kitchen. George Washington attended a wedding here. Open April-November, 322-2794.

Buena Vista. US 13, eight miles south of Wilmington and southeast of Newark. Built 1845-1847. Once home of John M. Clayton, U.S. Secretary of State under President Zachary Taylor. Visit by appointment only. 323-4430.

George Read II House and Gardens. 42 The Strand. Built between 1797 and 1804 in high Georgian style by the son of a signer of the Declaration of Independence. Formal garden designed in 1847. Three rooms furnished in the 20th-century Colonial Revival style. Open March-December. 322-8411.

Immanuel Episcopal Church. On the Green. (100 Harmony St.). Built in 1703, the first parish of the Church of England in Delaware. Burned in 1980 and rebuilt using the original walls and foundation. Tombstones in adjoining graveyard date from 1707, 328-2413.

New Castle Presbyterian Church. 25 E. Second St. Built in 1707 and used for services to 1854. Restored after World War II to original appearance. First congregation was Dutch. Open weekdays. 328-3279.

Old Court House. Market and Delaware Sts. Colonial Capitol of Delaware, built in 1732. Museum of Delaware history and government. Free. 323-4453.

Old Dutch House. 32 E. Third St. Reflects the 1651 founding of New Castle by the Dutch who called it Fort Casimir. Built in the 17th century and furnished with colonial antiques. Open April-November. 322-9168.

Old Library Museum. 40 E. Third St. Hexagonal Victorian building. Features special exhibits of New Castle and Delaware history. Open Thursday and Saturday year round. Free. 328-8215.








Dover Downs International Speedway. 1131 North duPont Highway, Dover. May and September bring NASCAR 200 and 500 stock car races to the raceway just north of Dover. Harness racing November-March, 674-4600.

Harrington Raceway. US 13, Harrington. Oldest parimutuel racing track in the U.S. Harness Racing September-November. 398-3269.

Historic Houses of Odessa. Main Street, Odessa. Two 18th century homes, the Corbit-Sharp and Wilson Warner houses. Fine examples of American architecture, furniture, silver and paintings. A third building, The Brick Hotel Gallery, will open in April with a nationally-known collection of Belter Victorian furniture. Administered by Winterthur Museum and Gardens. Open March-December. 378-2681.

Island Field Museum. Off US 113, South Bowers, Built over ongoing archaeological dig of prehistoric cemetary. Artifacts on display. Open March-November. Free. 335-5395.

John Dickinson Plantation. Off US 113 on Kitts Hummock Rd., Dover, John Dickinson, 1732-1808, was known as the "Penman of the American Revolution." This mansion, appropriately furnished with antiques, was his home as a child. Outbuildings and landscaping are to recreate the property as it was in the early 19th century. Free. 736-4266.

The Lindens. Route 6 northwest of Smyrna. Erected as a miller's house before 1765. Adjacent to this Dutch gabled dwelling is the PLANK HOUSE, an early log cabin. Free. 653-5419.

Octagonal Schoolhouse. DE 9, north of Little Creek. Built in 1831. Among the earliest one-room schoolhouses established by the Delaware Free School Act of 1829. Free. 736-4266.

Odessa, Construction began in 1773 with the interior completed 60 years later. The original Methodist congregation was established in 1708. Old St. Ann's Episcopal Church. South

Old Drawyer's Church. US 13 north of

Capital Complex Christ Episcopal Church. S. State & Water Sts. Built in 1734. Site for the monument honoring Caesar Rodney, Delaware's colonial patriot and signer of the Declaration of Independence. Free.

Delaware State Museum. 316 S. Governors Ave. Exhibits on many phases of Delaware life. The Johnson Memorial Building commemorates the Golden Age of the phonograph with an extensive collection of Victor Talking Machines. Free. 736-3260.

Delaware Supreme Court. The Green. Houses Delaware's highest court. By request in the main lobby, visitors can be guided through the building and the Supreme Court chamber. Free. 736-

The Governor's House, Woodburn. 151 Kings Hwy. Official residence of the Governor, built in 1790. Once a station on the Underground Railroad of pre-

information call 736-5656. The Green. State St. & Bank Lane. Public Square designed in 1722 in accordance with William Penn's orders of 1683. In 1775 Delaware's Continental Regiment mustered here for service in the Revolution, then marched to the main corps of Washington's Continental Army. In 1776, on this site the Declaration of Independence was read to the public, sparking a celebration which included the public burning of King George III's portrait. Free. 736-4266.

Hall of Records. Duke of York St. The State's public archives housed here. On display is the Royal Charter granted by Charles II to James, Duke of York, for the territory which became Delaware. Also on display are documents relating to Delaware's quick action in ratifying the Constitution. Free. 736-4266.

Legislative Hall. Legislative Ave. Built in 1932. Delaware's General Assembly, the Senate and House of Representatives, convenes here. Free. 736-4101.

Margaret O'Neill Visitor Center. Court & Federal Sts. (behind the Old State House). Visitor information center for Dover and Kent County. Features changing museum exhibits, slide show, gift shop specializing in Delaware items. Free. 736-4266.



Old State House. The Green. The second oldest State House in the country in continuous use. Guided tours begin at the Margaret O'Neill Visitor Center. Free. 736-4266.

Cannonball House Marine Museum. Front St., Lewes. Erected before 1797 and struck by a cannonball in the War of 1812 during the British bombardment of Lewes. Open on a seasonal basis. Call for details, 645-8719.


De Vries Monument. Pilottown Rd. Commemorates the 1631 settlement of the Dutch whaling colony of Zwaanendael and the erection of a fort on this site. The stockade was burned and all 28 settlers massacred by the Indians the following spring. Free.

Fisher-Martin House. Kings Hwy. Built about 1727 and undergoing restoration, the house serves as the information center for the Lewes Chamber of Commerce. Free. 645-8073.

Lewes Historical Society Complex. Ship Carpenter and W. Third Sts., Lewes. Restored buildings and store that have been moved to historic complex. Includes the BURTON-INGRAM HOUSE, EARLY PLANK HOUSE, ELLEGOOD HOUSE, RABBIT'S FERRY HOUSE and the THOMPSON COUNTRY STORE. Walking tours of the historic area begin at the Thompson Store. Group tours should make advance arrangements. Open on a seasonal basis. Call for details. 645-8073.

Lightship Overfalls. Front St. One of the last lightships to function on the East Coast. Open on a seasonal basis. Call for details, 645-8073.

Zwaanendael Museum. Kings Highway and Savannah Rd. A colorful replica of the City Hall in Hoorn, The Netherlands. Dedicated in 1931 to commemorate the 300th anniversary of the first Dutch settlement in what is now Delaware. Seafaring artifacts are on display. Free. 645-9418.



State Parks

Fenwick Island — Off Route 1, south of Bethany Beach. Where nature is at its best. Nothing but pounding waves, shimmering sand and open sky. 539-

Fort Delaware — On Pea Patch Island in the Delaware River. Board the passenger boat "Miss Kathy" at Delaware City for the delightful 15minute cruise to this enchanted nesting site of egrets, herons and ibis. The Civil War-vintage fort is a history buff's delight, open weekends and holidays from late April through September. 834-

Holts Landing — Off Route 26, north of Millville. Convenient access available to the calm waters of Indian River Bay. It's just 33 acres, but the hard clams and blueclaw crabs like it there just fine!

Killens Pond — Off U.S. 13, south of Felton. An ideal vacation spot in central Delaware, offering a variety of recreational activities, including a dive into an Olympic-sized pool or a lazy canoe ride on the 70-acre pond. 284-

Lums Pond — Route 71, near Kirkwood, Don't miss this popular outdoor paradise, the largest outdoor recreation facility in northern Delaware. Fishing, swimming, camping, boating, hiking, jogging, tennis and more! 368-

Trap Pond — Off Route 24, near Laurel. Delaware's first park offers the northernmost public owned stand of bald cypress in the country. Fishing is unparalleled, with largemouth bass. crapple, blugill and perch just waiting to bend you rod. 875-5153.

Mason Dixon Monument. South side of Fenwick Island Lighthouse, DE 1 and 54, DE and MD border. First marker laid in the historic, controversial survey conducted in 1751. Delaware's southern and western borders are formed by the Mason Dixon Line, making it the only state to lie both north and east of the Line. Free. 539-8129.

Prime Hook National Wildlife Refuge. Northeast of Milton off DE 1. Fishing, boat launching, hunting, canoeing, hiking, and sightseeing available at this haven for migrating mammals and waterfowl. 684-8419.

Rehoboth Art League. 12 Dodds Lane, Henlopen Acres, Rehoboth Beach. Summer and winter art classes are offered along with exhibits, performing arts events, and "Cottage" art tour each






