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## Project News

### Working Group Meeting #14 Recap

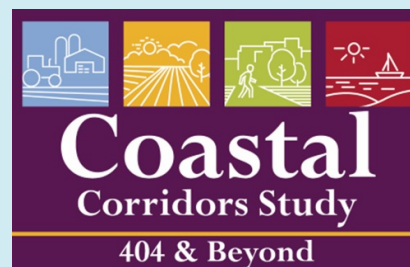
The fourteenth meeting of the Five Points Transportation Study Working Group was held as a hybrid meeting on Monday, January 30, 2023 with most DelDOT staff, Consultant Team members and Working Group members attending in person at the Cape Henlopen High School. The meeting included a review and status updates of the Five Points Transportation Study Implementation Plan. As of the January Working Group meeting, there were 62 of 78 recommendations in progress, ongoing or completed.

Other items on the January meeting agenda included:

- **CTP Projects Update – Shanté Hastings**, Deputy Secretary and Chief Engineer at DelDOT gave an update on the projects included in the Capital Transportation Program (CTP) in the Five Points Area. She highlighted those projects that are currently under construction; those that are in the planning and design stage; and projects that are new to the FY 2023-FY 2028 CTP. All total, DelDOT has programmed approximately \$250 million in projects in the Five Points Area. - **Plantation Road Improvements, Robbinsville Road to US 9 – Bryan Behrens**, Group Engineer Project Development South, and **George Pierce**, Project Manager South Construction, stated that the Plantation Road project has met several key milestones. Bryan and George highlighted progress to date as well as planned construction staging and detours. See article below for an exciting construction update!



- Coastal Corridors Study Update – Leah Kacanda**, Consultant Team Project Manager, provided an update on the on-going Coastal Corridors Study, which is focused on identifying transportation solutions for east-west routes in Sussex County including Route 16 and Routes 404/9 between US 113 and SR 1 as well as Redden Road and other local roads in the area. Leah noted that the Corridors Committee has already met twice with another meeting scheduled for February 13. She encouraged Working Group members to log on to the [Corridor Committees website](#) to review materials, take surveys, and sign up for updates. Members of the Study Team also conducted an engagement session with students at an English-as-a-Second-Language class in Georgetown to get feedback on existing conditions.

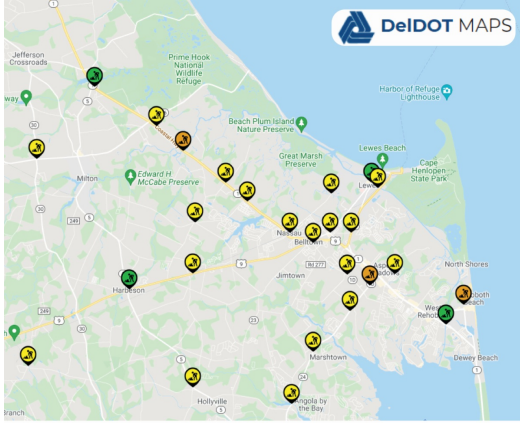

## Seat Belts Save Lives. Buckle Up, Delaware!

2022 was one of the deadliest years on Delaware roadways on record. The state recorded 165 fatalities last year – the state has not seen this many deaths on its roadways since 1988. So far in 2023, there have been 12 fatalities, which represents a 20% and a 50% increase over this same time period in 2022 and 2021, respectively.

These are very sobering statistics. 165 fatalities are too many. One fatality is too many. So what can you do to be a safe driver? You can start by wearing your seatbelt. The Delaware Office of Highway Safety (OHS) and police statewide are serious about seat belt safety. Seat belt use in Delaware is at an all-time high of 92.5%, yet still far too many people in our state continue to die as a result of being unrestrained when they are involved in a motor vehicle crash.

## OHS Seatbelt Facts

- March through July are the months with the most unrestrained crashes.
- 25% of unrestrained crashes happen between 2:00p.m. to 6:00p.m.
- Wearing a seat belt increases your chance of surviving a crash by almost 50%, while reducing the severity of injury.
- 53% of people involved in unrestrained crashes are males.
- You are four times more likely to be killed in a crash if you are ejected from a vehicle because you are not buckled up.
- Hospital data shows that unbelted occupants in crashes are 3 times more likely to require a hospital stay. On average, hospital costs for an unbelted crash victim are 55% higher than those for a belted crash victim.
- Strong seat belt laws protect families. When parents are buckled up, 90% of the time their children are too.



## Delaware Seat Belt Law

- It's a primary law, which means drivers can be pulled over and fined if a police officer sees anyone in a vehicle not buckled in.
- Everyone in the vehicle, including backseat passengers and children, must wear seat belts properly.
- Lap and shoulder belts must be worn and shoulder belts must not be placed behind the back or under the arm.

- The driver will receive a \$25.00 fine plus court costs which can add up to \$83.50.

### Guidelines to Buckle Up Safely

- Shoulder belts should never be placed behind the back or under the arm.
- Seat belt adjusters and extenders can help you get the best fit.
- Lap belts should rest across the hips, not the stomach.
- Bulky coats should be removed or unzipped so there's no gap between the strap and you.
- Shoulder belt should be placed across the middle of the chest, away from the neck.



### Securing Your Kids Safely

- Up to 8 years old (or 65 pounds) – must be properly restrained in a federally-approved child seat appropriate for the child's age, weight and height.
- 8-15 years – must wear seat belts.
- Under 12 (or 65 inches in height) – required to sit in the back seat if there are active air bags in the front passenger seating position.
- The penalty - \$25 for each unrestrained child.
